> How did you meet Geoff? I wasn't looking for it, and then he walked through my front door, and I was like, "Oh!" I had met him 12 years previously at an event. We talked about his love for Tofino, B.C. I said, "I love Tofino, too! I'm surprised I've never seen vou there." He said he went up there every summer to fish, and I said, "Take me fishing!" We share so many similarities. He's been in the public eye for a long time. I joke and say, "20 years in a locker room, 20 years on a tour bus." His performance has been scrutinized, both positively and negatively as a hockey player in Vancouver. He had to develop a thick skin around that.

Before you met Geoff, how did you get through the past couple of years? My two dear best friends, who both went through divorces and separations around the same time I did, we were in it together. We all carried each other and lifted each other up.

You have two young daughters. What aspirations do you have for them? For them to be happy, fulfilled and passionate about whatever they

The four years since your last record have been choose to do. They are very musical, very artistic rather tumultuous. When did you know you were and very dramatic – great actresses!

> Will the girls go on tour with you this year? They come on the summer ones; it's like a camping trip. They love it! They love travelling and they love experiencing new places. Every day is a new adventure. It's like, "What are we gonna do today, Mom? Where are we going to go?" We research each place before and there's always a science centre or museums. It's such an education and they are such great travellers because of it. India went all across the world with Afterglow [Sarah's 2003 album] from when she was 18 months to three years old. It's in her skin; she is happy behind the scenes. Taja, the little one, wants to be the party animal. The older one is my stylist and my toughest critic.

You've been in the business a long time. Have you ever been star-struck? Absolutely! I was probably 23 when I first met Peter Gabriel, who's my hero. I met him in a kitchen down in New Orleans. I walked in and he was in the fridge getting a beer and I stopped still in my tracks and my jaw fell to the ground! I had that feeling of, "I love this man, I love everything he stands for," and I did not even know what to say. I was like [she mumbles as if tongue-tied]. He asked what I was doing and I told him making a record and it's taking a long time and he said, "Yeah, me too." Then he said, "Have a great day!" I thought, "Oh, my God, I just spoke to Peter Gabriel!" So when people come up to me, and I can pretty much tell right away if they don't know what to say, I just hug them! We're all the same.

When you're not working, where do you go to decompress? Tofino, surfing, and Hawaii. Beach, sun and surf! Actually, I discovered the most exquisite place on earth - Desolation Sound [in B.C.'s Marine Provincial Park]. It's about halfway between Vancouver Island and Vancouver. It's just a group of inlets and islands. Geoff and I went up there on a boat last year and spent four days. We fished and we ate our catch for dinner. It's just beautiful to get away and be truly by ourselves; there is no one out there. The water is 75 degrees and we just paddled and fished all day. It was glorious.

Sounds like a dream date. Any other favourite ways to spend time together? Probably going for a hike, which would end in a swim in a lake. Then we'd come back and make dinner, watch a movie and do other things! [Laughs]
