

DICKENS FOR ALL

You can tour the home by candlelight, or partake in one of the costumed tours. The museum even offers a "Little Dickens" program for youngsters throughout the week.

WINTER GARDENS

Meander through Kensington Gardens (once the gardens of royalty) to the Peter Pan statue, commissioned by author J.M. Barrie himself. The whimsical statue was built in the gardens at that special spot that cultivated much of Barrie's ingenuity.

Twinkling lights abound in enchanting Kew Gardens. A mile-long illuminated path weaves through one of the world's most famous botanical gardens. Each step evokes a fairy-like land after dark, filled with a scented fire garden and a choir of holly bushes. Indulge in the mulled wine cider to stay toasty.

ICE AND WATER

Ice skating on London's favourite rink in the lovely Somerset House courtyard is a must-do. With the large Christmas tree as the backdrop and the grand historic buildings on either side of the rink, it certainly leaves an impression. Pop into
The Skate lounge for some yummy treats.
For something a little more decadent
after a skate, Fortnum's Lodge is the
perfect place to dine with family and
friends. The lodge is renowned for its
Welsh rarebit and popular "chocolossus"
hot chocolate. Perfect on a wintery day!

Cruise down England's longest river, the Thames, past festive lights. City Cruises has an array of holiday choices for the family, from Carols on the Thames to Teatime with a Christmas Twist. Indulge in the scrumptious traditional mince pies and sip on mulled wine.
